More than 90% of Georgia's forests are privately owned. That means there are very limited opportunities for +2,300 Georgia birdwatchers who support an estimated \$75 million in annual wildlife watching-related expenditures!

Georgia Bird Bookings connects you with Bird Watchers through a Birding Access Permit. Here is how it works:



Properties enrolled in Georgia Bird Bookings are searchable in a web application by Orbis called **My Outdoor Agent.**



Birdwatchers will select a property and purchase a **Birding Access Permit** through the digital application. They must agree to the terms of the access agreement and release of liability.



Landowners are paid for allowing access to their land! You control when and how you allow access.


